DESCRIPTION

The School of Nursing at the University of British Columbia's Okanagan campus invites applications for faculty positions at the rank of Assistant and Associate Professor of Teaching to begin as early as July 1, 2021. The School of Nursing [see <http://www.ubc.ca/okanagan/nursing/welcome.html>] is housed within the Faculty of Health and Social Development. The faculty also houses schools of Social Work and Health & Exercise Science. The School of Nursing offers undergraduate, master's, and doctoral programs in nursing. In addition to active partnerships with our surrounding communities and Interior Health, our school has international partnerships with schools in Ghana and Zambia.

Applicants must be eligible for registration with the British Columbia College of Nurses and Midwives. The successful candidates must have an established record of teaching and demonstrated teaching excellence at the undergraduate level and be prepared to teach undergraduate and nursing practice-based courses in the School. As faculty members in the educational leadership stream, the successful candidates will be expected to maintain a record of excellence in teaching, service, and educational leadership.

For the Assistant Professor of Teaching position, the successful candidate will have completed a minimum of a Master of Nursing or equivalent qualification and be able to lead faculty and school initiatives in promoting equity, diversity and inclusion.

UBC is one of the world's leading universities and is consistently ranked in the top 40. The university has two distinct campuses, one in Vancouver and one in Kelowna. UBC's Okanagan campus, located in the city of Kelowna, has over 10,000 students in seven faculties, with strong undergraduate and graduate programs. - Evidence of teaching effectiveness and excellence

2. Curriculum Vitae listing the following:

- Personal information and education
- University-level teaching and related experience
- Relevant licensure and qualifications

3. Teaching Dossier including the following:

- Teaching Philosophy Statement
- Statement of undergraduate teaching experience including a list of specific courses taught
- Samples of teaching and other relevant materials
- Summary of experience in curriculum and/or course development, teaching scholarship, and educational leadership
- Summary of peer or evaluations of teaching (if applicable)

4. Names of three referees who are able to provide objective evaluations of the applicant's suitability for the position including objective examples teaching ability and educational leadership.
